Fairtrade Guide

Fairtrade Fortnight also saw the launch of the Strathpeffer Fairtrade Guide. In this leaflet you will find all the shops, retail outlets, accommodations, and venues that serve, sell or use FT products. The leaflet is aimed at locals and visitors alike and will be available in various outlets throughout the village and beyond. To kick-start distribution, we have included a copy in this issue of the StrathTimes, for which we would like to thank Strathpeffer Community Centre.

Strathpeffer Fairtrade Group would also like to thank New York Trust Villa for their support in making this leaflet happen.

Fairtrade Fortnight has been widely celebrated in our village, with a Big Brew, the launch of the Strathpeffer Fairtrade Guide and a talk by a Nicaraguan Fairtrade coffee producer at the primary school.

Mrs Fatima Ismael came to the school on Wednesday 9th March to talk about Fairtrade coffee producers in Nicaragua. Fatima visited the pupils courtesy of the Scottish Fair Trade Forum, who



hosted her on a tour throughout Scotland. Fatima is General Manager of the coffee co-operative SOPPEXCCA. This is a union of 18 co-operatives located in a department in northern Nicaragua where 60% of the country's coffee is produced.

Fatima talked to the pupils of P4 to P7. She told them about growing coffee in Nicaragua and the difference Fair Trade makes for children and families in Nicaragua. She explained that since the cooperation started producing Fairtrade coffee (some 15 years ago), the number of producers has risen from around 60 to 650. The premium Fairtrade prices that they are being paid does not only help the producers but also their families and all the other families in a community, for example with setting up local schools for the children. It also means a much better position for women, whose participation has risen from less than 2 % to 30% since the co-operative was established.

Other benefits are campaigns against child labour, education of people in producing sustainably, and a training centre where youngsters can learn to be a

Pupils had the opportunity to ask Fatima questions and some had prepared to do so in Spanish. The visit went down really well, and the youngsters were very interested in the things Fatima had to say.

Making Waves

The fourth science festival was a great success with over 250 children and adults attending. There was lots to keep everyone entertained and informed with the chance to save a dolphin, learn about the leatherback turtle and what we can



do to help its environment.

Kids made their own periscope and helped build a coral reef. There were touch and hold seashore creatures and everyone found out how to get clean drinking water. Plus lots of other topics from river birds to sailing to extracting oil out of rocks.

This event was part of the British Science Week. Clara Hickey, Centre & Learning Manager of Strathpeffer Community Centre said "This is a great annual event which we have built up over the past four years. There is always lots to do and it's wonderful to see children having fun and learning about science at the same time."

Strathpeffer Art Fair

This free event is a chance to see some fantastic pieces of artwork all made my local people. Most of the artwork will be on sale and there will be a chance to buy some cards and prints. 

The Plan

To create a wonderful Community Park on the derelict land just beyond the Strathpeffer Primary School playing field.

Important achievements so far

- Strathpeffer Residents' Association formed in 2012.
- BIG lottery grand for Feasibility study
- Community Park show to be possible.
- Plans for park displayed and best one chosen by residents 201
- SRA becomes a charity (SCIO No. SC04687) February, 2016.
- Draft Business Plan for transfer of land to SRA sent to Highland Council in February 2016

Next steps

- Final version of Business Plan for transfer of land to Highland Council to be considered in April, 2016.
- Following decision of Highland Council to transfer land for the Community Park work can begin on applying for grants to fund the development of the park.
- Supporters of the Park become members*. Funders look for evidence of strong local support.
- Lots of membership forms are returned. Number of Community Park members is high.
- The Community Park Committee (SRA) successfully get grant funding
- 2017/18 appointment of project manager and contractors and the work begins! Hurray!

Strathpeffer Burns Club - 86th Anniversary Celebrations

On Friday 22nd, the 86th Celebration of the Strathpeffer Burns Club got off to a rousing start with Louise McBain piping in the President, Hugh A MacKay and the Principal Guest, Mr Angus MacKay and thereafter Piping in the Haggis which was skilfully carried aloft by David MacMaster before being addressed by the President.

The Strathpeffer Hotel "Bill o' Fare" was to the usual high standard and greatly enjoyed by all. Before the "Nicht's Ongauns" got into full swing the Club Secretary paid tribute to five members of the Club who had sadly passed away in the last year.

President, Hugh Aberach MacKay, introduced – Mr Angus MacKay, a native of Lewis but resident of Strathpeffer for many years – to propose the Toast to the Immortal Memory of Robert Burns. Angus commenced his Immortal by stating that his favourite poem was "to a Mouse" and was able to portray the fact that Burns poetry painted a very vivid, verbal picture, of what he saw in his day to day life. He concluded an excellent Immortal Memory by reminding everyone that we have much to be proud of in our National Bard.

In proposing the Toast to the Speaker, Alan Radin gave a very witty but nonetheless sincere thanks to our speaker. The Toast to "Oor Native Land" was

proposed by Liam Christie, former banker, well known Ross County supporter and broadcaster on North Highland Radio. In proposing the Toast, Liam turned poet himself and gave the company a clever and amusing insight into his view of our Native Land. The "Toast to the Lassies" was proposed by Frank Hallet, a self-confessed fan of women, who was delighted to have the opportunity to propose a Toast to them. However, he wasn't averse to poking a bit of fun at the Ladies much to the enjoyment of the menfolk. But, he redeemed himself by putting into verse the many attributes of women as recognized by Burns. Val Cameron gave the response to Frank's Toast, who indicated that the only reason she agreed to do the Reply was down to the fact that she would have the last word! She referred to Burn's poem on the "Rights of Women" yet 200 years later, men still don't seem to get the hang of it.

William Cochrane made his maiden speech in the Club by Proposing the Toast to the Club and Artistes. He spoke in glowing terms about the "resident band" - Hamish Polson, Louise McBain and Hamish Menzies. He then thanked, the superb vocalist, Emma Mitchell for her beautiful singing and Rod MacKenzie for his recitation about "The Barra Politician" before giving his impression of how the Club should move forward in future.

To end a superb evening, the "resident band" played for the singing of Auld Lang Syne and the National Anthem.
